** Family Support Group meetings are held on the first and third Tuesday of every month. Families are invited to join us in the Library on the first floor.


** Remember to check your family members' mail on your next visit.

Deborah Blake

Born in San Diego, California USA

Growing up in a family of 9 children was not easy. Deborah is the 8th child. She has always been sensitive, fair, caring and loves to share, except for her food. Deborah was so serious about her food growing up, that she didn't like anyone to even look at her plate or pretend to take food off of her plate. If any of her siblings touched her plate, she would get up and leave it, but not before giving a stern reprimand.

On Friday, March 24, I was fortunate to attend the "Biocom/Biogen Alzheimer's Research Forum," co-hosted by Biocom and Alzheimer's San Diego. Trisha Miyahara, one of our family members and co-facilitator of our Family Support Group, joined me. We found ourselves in the beautiful Alexandria building, home to the San Diego Biocom offices, on the Torrey Pines Mesa.

Mary Ball, CEO, Alzheimer's SD, and panelist at the forum wrote, "Recently both the Merck and Eli Lilly clinical drug trials ended in disappointment and now attention has turned to Biogen's aducanumab study. This experimental drug is showing promising results in its ability to remove toxic plaques in the brains of patients with early-stage Alzheimer's Disease." Samantha Budd Haeberlein, Vice President of Clinical Development at Biogen, was on the panel and looking forward to sharing the research and outcomes of the drug results of this Phase Three clinical trial. In the audience, some at times taking part on the panels, were scientists, medical doctors, family members of patients, two State Assembly members, and other stakeholders, including myself.

Although, the science of the studies, and the exploration into the workings of the human brain were discussions often beyond my scope of understanding, I did come away with more knowledge and information I would like to share. The most brilliant of scientists, researchers and professors are in awe of the human brain. The more they learn and discover, the more they realize they have yet to learn. Not only can a cell be broken down, but so can a neuron. Researchers have shown that all cells have different amounts of DNA and that there is more DNA in the frontal cortex. Only 1% of Alzheimer's Disease is familial. 99% of AD is sporadic, with age being the biggest predicting factor. With all the enormous research being done globally, and the most collaborative work being done in San Diego than any other place in the world, there is still no known cause for Alzheimer's.

Ten years ago, Biogen began research for a drug to address treatment of the disease. It takes twenty years for a drug to be tested and phased before it is available to the public. To date, all current treatments (eg: Aricept, Exelon, Razadyne, Namzaric) address symptoms. The new therapeutics in study phases address the progression of the disease. These are referred to as "disease modifying therapies" or DMTs. Research has discovered that beta amyloid (plaques) dysregulation is central to the disease. This dysregulation can begin up to twenty years before the onset of memory symptoms. The purpose of the new Biogen drug is to remove or stop the amyloid. A PET scan detects the presence of amyloid, but is a technology unavailable in most medical settings, not covered by medical insurance and only used in clinical research. Research needs funding, yet government programs are being cut. I began to feel the Catch 22 and frustration set in for me. Yet, the brilliant minds see the glass half full and persevere.

60 to 80% of all dementia is Alzheimer's Disease. In 2017, 5.5 million people in the USA are diagnosed and by 2050 that number will increase to 13.8 million. Globally, as we are living longer, that number will look epidemic.

I asked Trisha to share her take away thoughts on this stunning day we shared together. Her words are remarkable. "The world of dementia is the ultimate conundrum. There is still much unknown about this disease, (AD), but we are making progress. The more we learn about the causes, the more we learn how much more there is to know. The more cures we attempt, the more possibilities we uncover. Our perseverance to keep going forward is one of our defining human qualities. San Diego seems to be in the forefront of the research; Alzheimer's San Diego is absolutely the Gold Standard in outreach, creativity, and inclusion.

For caregivers, here are words for the "post it notes" that should be all over your home; "you cannot do this alone," "your feelings are normal," "the patient is isolated (in the world of dementia), even while physically present."

In short, there are discouraging setbacks, even while there are encouraging hints. It is exhausting work, but that's never stopped us before. Collaboration and Community will lead us through this thicket."
